Dear Convener and Committee members,

PUBLIC PETITION BY EDINBURGH SECULAR SOCIETY RE LOCAL AUTHORITUY EDUCATION COMMITTEES

As an ordinary citizen, I oppose the petition—by the Edinburgh Secular Society—who have no democratic mandate themselves and are in my view a tiny body of self - appointed—activists—unrepresentative of most Scots in villages, glens and cities who still—adhere to Christian tradition to an extent—and where church memberships still count in the hundreds of thousands.

No one other than a few secular lobby groups feel strongly about this issue of religious representatives and the majority of Scotland's population are content with the status quo .

Why pander to a small pressure group and their supporters? Scotland has a proud tradition of Christian culture. Why start to divest it of that culture in this year of all auspicious years. In what way is having church representatives on education bodies anti-democratic?

My contention is that secular lobby groups such as the ESS, and similar bodies, claim to be campaigning for secularism but in fact show signs of clear anti-religious and anti-Christian intolerance some might well argue?

As examples of this possible concern about secular groups being more atheist and antireligion in their views than strictly "secularist", I enclose some press cuttings of letters to newspaper editors: —

PRESS CUTTINGS

See THE SCOTSMAN of Friday 4 May 2012 where a letter from Neil Barber , media officer of the ESS , calls for civically supported church buildings to be used as churches on Sundays "but let them "also be open for the likes of kids' band rehearsals , atheist group meetings" between Monday and Saturday . ${\cal U}$

Beside the above letter on 4 May 2012 is a letter by Alistair McBay of the National Secular Society who writes of Christian and religious morality as " ...dogma from supernaturalists " .

In my view these letters show the attitude of atheist campaigners rather than secular ones .

See also two letters by Steuart Campbell ,treasurer of the Edinburgh Secular Society . One was published in the EDINBURGH EVENING NEWS on 14/10/13 , is headed "Heaven knows why they believe in this " and in it Mr Campbell makes plain his view " As this is the only life we will have ,we need to make the best of it , not wasting time on superstitious beliefs ..." .The other letter by Mr Campbell in THE SCOTSMAN in , I think , November 2013, and in it he states " ... belief in an afterlife is a ubiquitous and dangerous superstition that belittles our real lives , misleads millions and misdirects the course of their lives"

In the light of the sentiments in these letters I suggest that the PP Committee might wish to question whether the ESS is really not so much a secularist group as a campaigning atheistic or anti-religious group ?

I hope that the convener and his committee will consider the petition by the Edinburgh Secular Society in that possible alternative light?
